HATOG Conference 2017 By Anna Powless

This May 19-21 I was lucky enough to be invited to the 10th HATOG (Hungarian Americans Together) Conference. If you are like me you probably never heard of it and may have not been aware of the organizations either that sponsored the event; the Hungarian American Coalition, The Hungary Initiatives Foundation and the American Hungarian Heritage House.

HATOG is generally held annually, in a different U.S. city, and its purpose is to provide a forum for Hungarian organizations that work to maintain Hungarian heritage and culture in their communities. Approximately 70% of the participants were attending their first HATOG conference. There were altogether 60 participants from 16 states and from Hungary. "(The conference) is an opportunity to strengthen regional networks of organizations, provide opportunities for professional development but also to bring everyone together to address communitywide challenges, which oftentimes mimic what be happy to connect you with the right we see as challenges in our own organizations"

So what did I learn? First of all I was inspired by the number of enthusiastic, energetic and bright young people in the room who also



happened to be Hungarian and spoke Hungarian!

I learned that most everyone has similar challenges, but the bigger cities have larger memberships including more immigrants and first generation Hungarians. I met Hungarians from Los Angeles to New York. Although the majority who attended were from the east, Arizona, Colorado, and of course New Mexico were there to represent the Southwest. Most everyone had no idea that NM had a club!!

I learned about a very interesting program/ scholarship called *Reconnect Hungary* aimed at young people from 18-28 who have any degree of Hungarian heritage. This is a 2 week cultural immersion experience for anyone interested in exploring their heritage. Many of you may have grandchildren who may be seeking this kind of connection but no longer have relatives to make this happen. Chemist George Olah, Nobel Prize winner in 1994, died a few months ago at age 89. He was a Distinguished Professor of Chemistry, held other positions at the University of Southern California after teaching in Hungary and immigrating in 1956, first to England, Canada and then the United States. His contribution to the study of hydrocarbons, then the methanol economy, which he suggested can be produced from hydrogen gas using energy from renewable sources of power. He was a firm believer in climate change and planning for the future. His pioneering research redefined the field's landscape.

The Story About Jim's Lighter

Jim Tritten's surprise birthday present to a distant relative in Slovakia came back to Tritten recently as a photograph, a Christmas present that unites him to his grandfather and grandmother's heritage in Hungary.

It's an offbeat tale about a prized cigarette lighter becoming part of a remarkable collection I the small village of Svatuse, aka Szentes in Hungarian. It's in Slovakia today, but everyone speaks Hungarian, and thinks Hungarian, even though the mayor flies the Slovakian flag, officially.

Always curious about the Hungarian side of his family, in 2015 Jim headed to his ancestral village, where the mayor teasingly told him "the villagers have been interbreeding since the year 1000" so he should assume he is related to everyone in the village. Including a fellow named Bertalan Abahazy, the grandson of a second cousin.



The following year, Jim saw a story about the lighter collection posted by Victoria Abahazy on Facebook and contacted Bertalan who agreed to add the lighter to his collection at the

Lingo Bar in Szentes.


The Zippo Lighter in the above photograph on the left was purchased by James John Tritten, grandson of Julianna Feke and John Szucs two Hungarians originally from Bodrog Szentes.



Jim was trained as a United States Naval Aviator and earned his "Wings of Gold" on April 27, 1967. The photograph on the right is of Jim having his wings pinned on that date. At the time, Jim was a smoker, like most pilots in the Navy. It was common for pilots to purchase a lighter like this, sold in the Base Exchange at the Naval Air Station, Corpus Christi, Texas, where Jim thinks he purchased this one. He then had the lighter engraved with his initials and the date 4-27-67 signifying when he was awarded the wings depicted on the lighter. Jim used it for many years and probably lit a cigar or two for his grandfather John Szucs who survived until July 1969.

As shown above the lighter now has a special place on the wall of the Lingo bar in this small village. Jim hopes that the contribution of this lighter keeps alive the flame of family to the residents of Szentes, some of whom Jim met during his visit on September 30, 2015.
